Parks and Recreation

Long stretch of beach great for biking, roller blading, walking, etc. with a great view of Seattle skyline across Elliot Bay. Coffee shops and restaurants nearby.

Discovery Park

Huge 500+ acre park with over 150 species of wildlife. The sunsets are free and it is a nice escape from the city. Also in the park is Daybreak Star Indian Cultural Center, the headquarters of United Indians of All Tribes with an art gallery and store. Hours Mon.-Fri 8:30 AM-5 PM/Sat. 10-5/Sun. noon-5 PM

Gas Works Park
On Lake Union just south of Wallingford. A perfect place to fly kites, have a picnic, play Frisbee, or just run around the 20 acres of green grass. Not directly accessible, by bus, but Metro's #26 will get you within a few blocks north of the park. The Burke-Gilman Trail goes directly to the entrance.

Golden Gardens
West of Ballard on Puget Sound. Beautiful sandy beach with an amazing view of the sunset and the Olympic Mountains. They also have fire pits, fishing pier and marina. Bus access only in summer.

Greenlake
North of Wallingford Metro buses #16, 27 or 48

Serene lake in the middle of the city with a 3 mile jogging/biking/roller blading loop all the way around. There is also a community center with a pool, basketball hoops, baseball diamond, tennis courts, playground and boat rentals. Close to Woodland Park which has soccer fields, tennis courts and tons of picnic places.

Volunteer Park

Capitol Hill in the Heart of Seattle Metro #7, 9 or 10. The home of the Seattle Asian Art Museum (SAAM), the Conservatory and 520 foot tall Water Tower with 106 steps to the top (the Space Needle is 725 feet). The 45 acre park also has a children's play space, tennis courts and various historical monuments.

While there, check out . . .

Lake View Cemetery

(1554 15th Avenue East—Open daily 9-6 PM). The graves of Seattle pioneers and Bruce Lee with his son, Brandon Lee. To find the Lee graves look for the 20 foot monument (looks like Washington Monument) and walk east from there.

WA Park Arboretum and Japanese Garden

206.543.8800 Metro #11
More than 200 acres of lush green trees, both native to the Pacific Northwest and exotic species. There are free guided tours departing from the Visitor Center at 1 PM on the weekends and tons of short trails throughout the Park. The Japanese Garden is on the west side of the park and costs \$2.50 for adults and \$1.50 for 6-18 year olds.

More FUN stuff—not so cheap

Woodland Park Zoo

The Seattle Zoo is a pioneer in open environment exhibits where animals live in natural settings with a minimum of fences.

FREE magnificent rose garden on the south side. Admission is \$9 for adults/\$8.25 for seniors/\$6.50 ages 6-17/\$4.25 ages 3-5. Hours (10-6 PM daily including holidays). Parking \$3.50.

Seattle Aquarium

1483 Alaskan Way, Pier 59 just below Pike Place Market 206.386.4320

Over 366 species of fish, otters, seals, an underwater dome tank and diving birds. Visitors can watch diving birds being fed at 11 AM, fish at 1:30 PM and otters and seals at 11:30, 2 and 5 PM daily. Admission is \$8.50 for adults/\$7.50 for seniors/\$5.75 ages 6-18/\$3.75 ages 3-5. Discounts for King County residents and groups of 10 or more. Hours are 10 AM-7 PM daily Memorial Day to Labor Day. 10 AM to 5 PM daily during winter months.

Pioneer Square Underground Tours

1st Avenue and Yesler Way 206.682.4646.
Preserved beneath Pioneer Square is "Old Seattle." After the fire of 1889, the city was reconstructed above the ruins. The un-restored portion, called the "underground city" may be toured. Tour hours are 10 AM to 6 PM. Cost is \$8 for adults and payable by cash only at the box office in Pioneer Square.

BOOKS AND LITERATURE

Libraries

Check your phone book or look on the web for your local libraries. Seattle has it's own library system, the rest of King County is served by the King County Library System.

Bookstores

Barnes and Noble Booksellers/Borders Books and Music

(check phone book for sites) They both have some cheap books (even hardbacks) on their clearance tables. Hardbacks can be as little as \$3 for classics titles. Both stores also have a calendar of free readings by authors and live music. These stores are also great places to browse—comfy chairs, aisles and aisles of books on everything you could imagine. Some have cafes too.

Independent Book Stores

1st Avenue S. and S. Main St. Pioneer Square, downtown 206.624.6600 High-brow and middle-brow stuff. Free readings by some authors promoting their books. You may have to go in ahead of time to reserve/pick up tickets. The bookstore publishes its monthly listing of events which includes lots of book readings by well-known authors. They also have a nice café downstairs.

University Bookstore

shop, art and writing supplies, large children's book section and music.

Used Bookstores-they're the best and they're all over the place!

Usually not as organized as regular book stores, but they have character and they're cheap. A few of them are listed below. You can sell your used books to them, however, don't expect to get very much for them.

Applications take 8-10 weeks to process. When access to one program is granted, women can access all of the available services

Grocery Stores

As you may imagine, there are tons of stores in a city as large as Seattle. Listed below are some of the stores that more commonly have good deals. Remember creativity is important when finding bargains. This may also be a good opportunity to explore new neighborhoods.

Chains—these stores are the major chains you will probably have in your 'hood. They all have their own brands.

QFC—known for good produce and a “higher quality” (and price) of groceries.

Safeway—cheapest of the big chains.

Albertson's—great bakery.

PCC Puget Sound Consumer Co-op, which you can join. You can find many organic foods and vitamins and supplements under one roof. If you pay with food stamps they will give you member prices.

Others:

- **Central Co-op** 1835 12th Ave. on Capitol Hill-12th and Denny
- **City Greens** 45th and 12th NE in the U-District, 2 blocks from the “Ave.” This store has lots of produce, organic foods, lots of specialty health foods and a walk-in wine and beer cold room.
- **McPherson’s** 12th and Beacon on Beacon Hill
- **Rising Sun Produce** 65th and 15th NE in Ravenna. Lots of fresh and seasonal fruits and veggies in this outside corner market.
- **Trader’s Joe’s** 100 West Galer on Queen Anne Hill. Also stores are in Burien, Kirkland and Bellevue. This is a California chain that sells specialty, gourmet and ethnic foods at very good prices. Lots of cheeses, pastas, sauces, crackers, frozen entrees, dressings, etc. Does not accept food stamps.
- **United Grocers** has cash and carry stores that will sell to the public. No checks or credit cards.
- **Bakery Thrift Stores**—Just baked goods, but lots of them and cheap.
- **Gai’s Northwest Bakery** runs a number of these throughout the city. 13102 Stone Way N, 1760 4th South and 21504 84th South.
- **Entenmann’s Orowheat Thrift Store** 9578 1st NE
- **Interstate Brands (mmm, Twinkies)** on 20th and Jackson. Call 322.4242 for other locations.

In general a good place to get cheaper produce is the International District (south of downtown). Some of the items may be foreign to you, but it could be a great opportunity to learn about a new culture through its cuisine. Explore new things!

Clothing/Retail

Living on a small AmeriCorps/Vista living allowance doesn’t leave a lot of left over spending money for clothes. This year branch out and seek out the incredible finds at thrift sores, consignment shops, clearance racks, and even garage sales in the spring and summer. Also think about these places when trying to furnish your house/apt. Please don’t consider this list as the only places to go—there are tons of places, explore, ask around, look in the Yellow Pages. Good Luck!

Downtown Retail—The Bon Marche often has clearance, discontinued, or out-of-season stuff in their basement. Try the Nordstrom Rack on 2nd and Pine for cheaper clothing and a large shoe selection. Otherwise, practice window shopping.

Second Hand Thrift Stores—yeah, a little picked over, and it takes a little more time, but have patience and you may find treasures and unique items. Buying from these stores also helps the organizations that run them.

- **Salvation Army** 110 4th S., 4th and Royal Brougham, near Safeco Field
- **Thriftko** 85th and Greenwood
- **Shop & Save** all over Puget Sound

Second Hand Sporting Goods—these are excellent places to get sporting equipment especially if you just want to try something new or you just need some boots for the weekend hiking trip.
